

THE STATE ARCHIVES MAINTAINS ALL BIRTH, MARRIAGE AND DEATH RECORDS FROM MAY 1848 THROUGH MAY 1878. All requests for vital records information after May 1878 should be directed to: State Registrar - Search Unit, New Jersey State Department of Health, CN 360, Trenton, New Jersey 08625

THE ADVANCE FEE FOR EACH SEARCH TYPE (i.e. BIRTH, DEATH or MARRIAGE) IS FOUR DOLLARS (\$4.00) PER NAME. IF BIRTH, DEATH, AND MARRIAGE RECORDS ARE REQUESTED FOR ONE PERSON, THE TOTAL ADVANCE FEE WILL BE TWELVE DOLLARS (3 search types X \$4.00 = \$12.00). IF FOUND, A TYPED TRANSCRIPT WILL BE MAILED AT NO ADDITIONAL CHARGE. ALL FEES ARE NONREFUNDABLE, WHETHER OR NOT THE REQUESTED RECORDS ARE FOUND.
