Congratulations to Glenn and best wishes for continued success from the officers and members of NJ-AAHGS.



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## IN REMEMBRANCE OF JAMES DENT WALKER

James Dent Walker, organizer and charter president of the Afro-American Historical and Genealogical Society, Inc. died in Washington, D. C. on October 6, 1993. We pause to the significant remember contribution that he made to genealogy and the furtherance family history Black We are benefitting research. leadership his foresight daily.

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September 18, 1995 - The U.S. Post Office issued a series of stamps honoring the achievements of jazz musicians, including Charles Mingus, Thelonious Monk, Charlie Parker and Eubie Blake.

If a mix of Low Country seafood, a gospel shout and a trail of historic Black landmarks suits your fancy, then plan to head to St. Helena, South Carolina, for the 15th annual Penn Center Heritage Festival November 9-12, 1995.

Located in Beaufort County, just across the bridge from Port Royal, the island is home to a large Black community noted for their authentic Sea Island culture.

Here African retentions remain strong in the preservation of the Gullah dialect, basket weaving craft and gospel shout.

The festival includes four days of Afrocentric goods and crafts, an educational symposium and church services, a parade and live music performances, and much more.

St. Helena's celebs include noted author, Gloria Naylor; Kitty Green, owner of Gullah House restaurant featured in Lawry's seasoning ads; and Ron and Natalie Daise of the Nickelodean Series, Gullah, Gullah Island.

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AN UNFORGETTABLE TRIP
IN SUMMER 1995

A trip taken this past summer to Egypt included NJ-AAHGS member, M.Leon Banks. Led by William Still and Friends, the group visited Cairo, Luxor and Aswan the capital of Nubia in ancient times.

Sights of Pyramids of Giza and the Sphinx, the Coptic Museum, and the Egyptian Museum, as well as a view of village life and a cruise on the Nile, were just some of the wonders that Mr. Banks experienced. In his own words, he expresses how this trip, which lasted from July 14-28, 1995, affected his life:

"My Fellow Nubian/Americans:

"We were asked to make comments or give our concepts about Egypt by the Nubian P. R. person on our arrival in Aswan, Egypt, during our stay from July 13 - 28, 1995.

"When you really see and bear witness with wonder to the tales of Egypt, which have confounded scholars of the world throughout the centuries, then perhaps you'll actually shiver with amazement at this kingdom world. I felt personally with touched certain kinship to the making of its shining history and magnificent past and will be compelled to continue to learn more about it in the future. (Continued - Page 6)

# GENEALOGY - HOW TO START

- 1. Read one of the "How to" books at your local library.
- 2. Write down everything you know about your family and its history.
- 3. Talk to or write to your relatives, especially older ones, and find out what they can add to your knowledge of the family.
- 4. Obtain birth, death and marriage records from the Bureau of Vital Statistics.
- 5. Obtain religious records (Baptisms, confirmations, etc.) from church records.
- 6. Visit, call or write to cemeteries where your family is buried, copy down gravestone inscriptions, photograph the gravesite, and check the cemetery's office for additional information.
- 7. Visit, call or write to the local newspaper and/or library for the death listing and/or obituary.
- 8. Visit, call or write to funeral directors if they are still in existence.

Call or visit the local

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florist, and the monument company nearest to the cemetery.

- 9. Check the Federal Census records and Soundex for 1920, 1900 and 1880.
- 10. Check the New Jersey State Census for 1915, 1905 and 1895.
- ll. Check the county courthouse or Hall of Records for wills, administrations, deeds, inventories, etc.
- 12. Investigate naturalization records at the city, county or state courts.
- 13. Investigate immigration (passenger list) records at the National Archives in NYC.
- 14. Check military records.
- 15. Visit your local Mormon Family History Center. You may be able to o tain church & other vital records on microfilm.
- 16. Visit, call or write to State and County historical and genealogical societies.
- 17. Attend lectures and presentations on genealogical research at your local
